### Background

program to address learning loss and students' needs as a result of the pandemic to include	
bothacademic and social-emotional learning components. Students will receive remediation/enrichment	
in both ELA and Math, and have access to mental health professionals for SEL lessons throughout the	
month-long summer program in addition to the physical education and healthy lifestyle activities.	
Expansion of Mental Health and Social-Emotional Supports: The district hired an additional school	137261

fluency, and enhance the learning environment with 21 Century skills. Promethean boards were installed	
in every classroom, iPads were purchased to support the K-1 classrooms, and a CAD computer lab will	
enhance the technology education program in our district.
