Background

The online application may only be submitted/certified by the chief school officer of the applicant LEA. The designated superintendent (public school LEAs) or the chief executive officer, board of trustees president, or school employee designated by the board of trustees (charter school LEAs), are the only administrators with the submit/certify rights necessary to successfully submit and certify a completed application for NYSED review.

We have presented to the BOE in public session on three different occasions since February of 2022. The district also notified the public via enewsletters in February 2022, March 2022, April 2022 and May of 2022 of plans for ARP-ESSER funding. In addition, parents were surveyed in February- March of 2022 and asked to provide input regarding what enrichment programming they would like to see in place for the summer and coming school year. From that survey, the district began to build its enrichment opportunites and will be providing 20 different programs for student sthis ummer, as well as a Summer Academy for grades 6-8, and a summer early literacy program for grades K-2.
