Background

Section 9-a of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2021, as amended by §5-a of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2022 requires, on or before July 1, 2022, <u>every</u> local educational agency (LEA) receiving funding from the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funding from the American Rescue Plan (ARP) act of 2021 to post on its website and submit to the New York State Education Departent (NYSED) an updated plan of how such funds will be expended and how the LEA will prioritized spending on non-recurring expenses as defined in section 9-a(1) of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2021. This updated plan must include:

Instructions

The State Budget Reporting Survey is due by July 1, 2022.

LEAs must complete all sections and are required to answer questions marked with a red asterisk. If a required question has not been completed, the business portal will highlight it in red and the section of the application will be flagged. The applicant will be unable to submit the application to NYSED for final review if a required question remains unresolved.

The online application may only be submitted/certified by the chief school officer of the applicant LEA. The designated superintendent (public school LEAs) or the chief executive officer, board of trustees president, or school employee designated by the board of trustees (charter school LEAs), are the only administrators with the submit/certify rights necessary to successfully submit and certify a completed application for NYSED review.

LEAs are NOT REQUIRED to send hard copies of survey materials to the Department.

The Eldred Central School District is in the process of updating the ARP plan based upon expenditures and remaining funds left in ESSER ARP. Public comment focused largely on the need for more individualized instruction and tutoring for students that have been effected by COVID era learning loss. The public comment indicated satisfaction with the expanded summer school program which we will continue to run through the summer of 2024. The first year of returning to in person instruction saw funds spent on maximizing in person instruction by hiring more substitutes to cover when key personnel were out on quarantines. We are taking additional public comment as we update the plan to reallocate those funds to more instructional programs in the following year. It was clear the public's primary concern was addressing learning loss and credit recovery for students who fell behind, with a secondary focus on activities and extra curriculars so students can experience an ordinary educational setting.

The expanded summer school program for elementary students seeks to bring students up to grade level. The primary focus will be reading and math. Students who are scoring below a 3 (meets standards) are invited to the program. We are expecting participation of about 100 students (enrollment is 248) so roughly 40% of the school. We seek to keep classrooms below 15 students.	15:1
We are offering after school tutoring for all major subjects in the high-school. This is open to all students. We seek to have a 3 student to 1 teacher ratio if possible. We are developing new goals for this program using this years data as a baseline for improvement.
