Background

Section 9-a of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2021, as amended by §5-a of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2022 requires, on or before July 1, 2022, <u>every</u> local educational agency (LEA) receiving funding from the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funding from the American Rescue Plan (ARP) act of 2021 to post on its website and submit to the New York State Education Departent (NYSED) an updated plan of how such funds will be expended and how the LEA will prioritized spending on non-recurring expenses as defined in section 9-a(1) of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2021. This updated plan must include:

An analysis of public comment;

Goals and ratios for pupil support;

Detailed summaries of Investments in current year activities; and

Instructions

The State Budget Reporting Survey is due by July 1, 2022.

LEAs must complete all sections and are required to answer questions marked with a red asterisk. If a required question has not been completed, the business portal will highlight it in red and the section of the application will be flagged. The applicant will be unable to submit the application to NYSED for final review if a required question remains unresolved.

The online application may only be submitted/certified by the chief school officer of the applicant LEA. The designated superintendent (public school LEAs)

or the chief executive officer, board of trustees president, or school employee designated by the board of trustees (charter school LEAs), are the only

administrators with the submit/certify rights necessary to successfully submit and certify a completed application for NYSED review.

LEAs are NOT REQUIRED to send hard copies of survey materials to the Department.

The District engaged in meaningful consultation with various stakeholders of the Pulaski Academy and Central School District. The District Leadership Team, made up of building principals, directors of transportation, facilities, food service, technology, and special programs, district data coordinator, business manager and superintendent, met in May 2021 to discuss the ARP-ESSER grant. Faculty meetings were held at both our elementary and middle-high school locations. At monthly meetings with parents and community members, the ARP-ESSER grant plans were reviewed to gather feedback. And on June 8, 2021, the ARP-ESSER grant allocation amounts and plans for spending in accordance with grant requirements were discussed at the Board of Education meeting. Conversations focused on how the District will use its ARP-ESSER funds and the impact on students for teaching, learning and day-to-day school experiences and operations.

Pulaski Academy and Central Schools has continued to engage with stakeholders throughout the implementation of the grant. Specifically, the District Leadership Team meets monthly to provide updates to the Superintendent of Schools pertaining to grant funded initiatives in the areas of student achievement, educational programs, and school services and programs in the areas of maintenance, transportation, food services, technology, and student social and emotional supports.

The District Advisory Council met 4 times this year, and twice during the summer to share information pertinent to grant funded programs and to continue to plan and enhance school programs funded through the grant. Faculty and staff are provided with district updates during staff development days scheduled during beginning of the year (September), middle of the year (March) and end of the year (June). In addition, building level updates pertaining to the initiatives funded through the grant are provided at monthly faculty meetings during the school year. In addition, the Pulaski Board of Education has received a presentation about grant funded program in the areas of Educational Programs (in October) and Student Achievement (in November) of the school year.

With regard to community and parental communications, PACS has included updates in the Pulaski Program Guide Mailing sent in August to homes. In addition, PACS annual surveys to parents, students, and staff will include survey items to garner feedback from stakeholders about the grant funded initiatives and programs. Information and feedback from the surveys is then shared with the Board of Education, District Leadership Team, and District Advisory Council to continue to enhance school programs. The Superintenedent of Schools hosts monthly "Coffee House" meetings to discuss district initiatives with parents and community members as well as garner stakeholder feedback and input.

Feedback from teachers, administrators, school counselors, school leaders, and school staff was collected during the District Advisory meetings. Feedback from parents was collected throughout the communication process (ie. primarily during Board of Education and Parent Group meetings and through surveys distributed to parents). We will continue gathering feedback through these mechanisms.

Summary of New Programs or Expansion of Existing Programs in Current Year	Investment (\$)
In order to maintain district operations during the 2021-2022, funds were spent on salary and employee benefits for a music teacher. Funds were used to support students in the area music and band for the middle-high school in order to maintain current programming and to support the ongoing functionality of the school district.	106329
The District addressed learning loss by providing more opportunities for professional development for all teachers. Funds were spent on salary and benefits costs for teachers to attend professional development and also for cost of courses attended. The district also used funds to support interventiona and enrichment programs for students to address and minimize learning loss.	39612
The District purchased materials and supplies for student enrichment and intervention programs. For the 2021-2022 school year these included: a headset for the football program, additional marching bells to increase partcipation in marching band, speakers and subwoofer for student DJ club, and a pottery kiln for the elementary art class program.	13288
