Background

The applicant will be unable to submit the application to NYSED for final review if a required question remains unresolved.

The online application may only be submitted/certified by the chief school officer of the applicant LEA. The designated superintendent (public school LEAs)

or the chief executive officer, board of trustees president, or school employee designated by the board of trustees (charter school LEAs), are the only

administrators with the submit/certify rights necessary to successfully submit and certify a completed application for NYSED review.

LEAs are NOT REQUIRED to send hard copies of survey materials to the Department.

School leadership determined that budgeted professional development and Chromebooks were no longer a priority and elected to utilize more resources towards targeted interventions provided by the ENL/Amazon Future Engineer STEM Teacher.

The response to the ARP program funding has been positive.

The iReady system has been an effective way to monitor growth in both reading and mathematics in the absence of NYS testing. Additionally, it has provided the school with additional data in order to develop small groups and address deficiencies in learning to mitigate the learning loss that has occurred from the pandemic. The targeted summer program in 2021 and the test preparation program afforded HSACS the opportunity to provide additional remediation to students in both reading and math to support student growth. The incorporation of additional instructors for the Response to Intervention (RTI) program has been one of the most valuable assets that has come from the funding. RTI instructors provide additional reinforcement through the use of small group and individualized instruction for the foundational skills that may have been loss during the pandemic. Through the implementation of STEM and Amplify Science, HSACS is able to provide additional high-interest exposure for middle school students as they prepare for high school.
