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## **Background and Instructions**

#### Background

Section 9-a of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2021, as amended by §5-a of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2022 requires, on or before July 1, 2022, <u>every</u> local educational agency (LEA) receiving funding from the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funding from the American Rescue Plan (ARP) act of 2021 to post on its website and submit to the New York State Education Departent (NYSED) an updated plan of how such funds will be expended and how the LEA will prioritized spending on non-recurring expenses as defined in section 9-a(1) of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2021. This updated plan must include:

An analysis of public comment;

Goals and ratios for pupil support;

Detailed summaries of Investments in current year activities; and

Balance of funds spent in priority areas.

#### Instructions

#### The State Budget Reporting Survey is due by July 1, 2022.

LEAs must complete all sections and are required to answer questions marked with a red asterisk. If a required question has not been completed, the business portal will highlight it in red and the section of the application will be flagged. The applicant will be unable to submit the application to NYSED for final review if a required question remains unresolved.

The online application may only be submitted/certified by the chief school officer of the applicant LEA. The designated superintendent (public school LEAs)

or the chief executive officer, board of trustees president, or school employee designated by the board of trustees (charter school LEAs), are the only

administrators with the submit/certify rights necessary to successfully submit and certify a completed application for NYSED review.

LEAs are NOT REQUIRED to send hard copies of survey materials to the Department.

Carthage sent out a survey to all stakeholders in the beginning of June. There were 709 responses. The results of the survey show the support for how the District is using stimulus funds. There was majority support for summer programming at the Kindergarten, Elementary, and Middle School levels. 49% supported summer programming at the high school level. The District plans to go ahead with programs for all of these levels this summer. There was strong support for after school programming: Elementary 73%, Middle School 68%, and High School 49%. 84% of those surveyed felt the District should once again purchase all school supplies with stimulus funds for all students .The following uses of stimulus funds also garnered support: Additional Safety Officer, Lead Teacher Facilitator positions, Professional Development fro Teachers, Athletic Trainer, Building Substitute positions, as well as AIS Reading and Math teachers. The majority of the free response answers included support for summer and afterschool programming, a desire for more social worker/counselors, free meals, and increased school safety.
