Background

Section 9-a of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2021, as amended by §5-a of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2022 requires, on or before July 1, 2022, <u>every</u> local educational agency (LEA) receiving funding from the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funding from the American Rescue Plan (ARP) act of 2021 to post on its website and submit to the New York State Education Departent (NYSED) an updated plan of how such funds will be expended and how the LEA will prioritized spending on non-recurring expenses as defined in section 9-a(1) of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2021. Instructions

The State Budget Reporting Survey is due by July 1, 2022.

LEAs must complete all sections and are required to answer questions marked with a red asterisk. If a required question has not been completed, the business portal will highlight it in red and the section of the application will be flagged. The applicant will be unable to submit the application to NYSED for final review if a required question remains unresolved.

The online application may only be submitted/certified by the chief school officer of the applicant LEA. The designated superintendent (public school LEAs)

or the chief executive officer, board of trustees president, or school employee designated by the board of trustees (charter school LEAs), are the only

administrators with the submit/certify rights necessary to successfully submit and certify a completed application for NYSED review.

LEAs are NOT REQUIRED to send hard copies of survey materials to the Department.

As part of ESSER III funding, Unity applied additional financial resources towards salaries for our English as a New Language Instructor, Director of Transition Services, social workers, academic interventionists, instructional coaches, science learning specialists, math learning specialists, director of counseling, and summer academy instructors. Unity also applied additional financial resources for rapid COVID testing, health screening software, technology software, and technology supplies. The funding period for this grant is from March 2020 through September 2024. Overall, public comment from new families, returning families, and community members was positive. Families were impressed with the variety of new staff positions we were able to support with the funding and appreciated the hiring of additional teachers and support systems for our students. Families agreed on the importance of social workers. Some families were concerned we were not allocating enough to personal protective equiment or technology for students, but we assured stakeholders that additional PPE and technology was secured through outside additional grant funding separate from ARP ESSER. Families were suprised to see the high cost of COVID testing, but understood the need for it.
