Background

Section 9-a of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2021, as amended by §5-a of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2022 requires, on or before July 1, 2022, <u>every</u> local educational agency (LEA) receiving funding from the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funding from the American Rescue Plan (ARP) act of 2021 to post on its website and submit to the New York State Education Departent (NYSED) an updated plan of how such funds will be expended and how the LEA will prioritized spending on non-recurring expenses as defined in section 9-a(1) of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2021. This updated plan must include:

Goals and ratios for pupil support;

Detailed summaries of Investments in current year activities; and

Instructions

The State Budget Reporting Survey is due by July 1, 2022.

LEAs must complete all sections and are required to answer questions marked with a red asterisk. If a required question has not been completed, the business portal will highlight it in red and the section of the application will be flagged. The applicant will be unable to submit the application to NYSED for final review if a required question remains unresolved.

The online application may only be submitted/certified by the chief school officer of the applicant LEA. The designated superintendent (public school LEAs) or the chief executive officer, board of trustees president, or school employee designated by the board of trustees (charter school LEAs), are the only administrators with the submit/certify rights necessary to successfully submit and certify a completed application for NYSED review.

LEAs are NOT REQUIRED to send hard copies of survey materials to the Department.

The changes to the budget include a movement of the cost of Summer Stipends, that has recently been covered by private support. We request a reduction to \$80k for Summer Stipends for teachers over the total grant period - a change from the \$120k. Additionally, we request a reduction of Lavinia and Writopia cost to \$0; an increase in Charter School Athletics Association/sports programming from \$5k to \$20,000. Additionally, within purchased services, we request the addition of Metamorphosis, Charter Analytics, and iReady for a total of \$136,050 between the three services. Additionally, we request an increase of \$64,950 to technology equipment, an increase from the \$41k.

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 Please provide an analysis of public comment for the updated American Rescue Plan (ARP) - Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funding.

While ESSER III funds have not been fully incurred yet and will begin use July 1, 2022, GO-NYC plans on utilizing the salaried funds and fringe/benefits as previously reported. Through the use of Lavinia, GO-NYC has decided to change focus and vendor to be more expansive of the needs of GO-NYC students through Metamorphosis, Charter Analytics, and iReady. Additionally, since some of the Summer Stipend costs were covered through an additional funder, the ARP ESSER funding has been reallocated to increase purchased services and provide further enrichment for GO-NYC students. The need for technology has increased as well, and this is reflected in the increased fund allocation.
