

LETTER OF INTENT TO APPLY

With this letter of Intent, we formally acknowledge our intent to apply for a charter to the New York State Education Department (“NYSED”) for Primary Hall Preparatory Charter School (“Primary Hall”). This letter is organized as requested by the NYSED 2019 Request for Proposals.

II. Proposed Charter School Information

- a. **Proposed school name:** Primary Hall Preparatory Charter School (“Primary Hall”)
- b. **Proposed school mission statement:** Through rigorous curriculum, individualized supports, and positive character development, Primary Hall Preparatory Charter School ensures all students in Kindergarten through fifth grade are prepared for academic and personal success in middle school, high school, and college.
- c. **Proposed school location:** Primary Hall intends to locate on the East Side of Buffalo in the 14212 and 14211 zip codes and intends to lease space on the open market. We will work with local developers and commercial real estate agents to identify an accessible, viable, and affordable building that complies with all local, state, and federal requirements.
- d. **Target population/community served:** Our target population are K-5 students residing on the East Side of Buffalo in zip codes 14211 and 14212. Buffalo Public Schools (“BPS”) educates 31,398 students across 67 schools. Schiller Park on the East Side has a predominately African-American population; 81% are African-American/Black, 12% White, and 2% Asian.² Average household income is \$18,825, with a high concentration of residents living in poverty; 83% of children live in households with Supplemental Security Income or Food Stamps/SNAP benefits; 42.9% of adults have less than a high school diploma compared to 16.1% in Buffalo.³ The crime rate in Buffalo is high, with a 1 in 89 chance of being victim to a violent crime compared to a 1 in 266 chance in New York State.⁴ In Schiller Park, the crime rate is 157% higher than the national average, with a 1 in 15 chance of being a crime victim.⁵ The average performance on 2017-18 state assessments in grades 3-8 for traditional public schools in the 14211/14212 zip codes was 8% in ELA and 6% in Math. BPS currently has a 63% high school graduation rate, with a goal of 70% by the end of the 2018-2019 school year. BPS data shows a consistent trend of wide gaps in performance, particularly for students of color compared to their white counterparts as well as MLLs/ELLs and students with disabilities. There are 8,066 children under the age of 18 in

14211/14212, with ≈1,502 under the age of 5. Across Buffalo there is a demand for charter schools, with 3,000+ names on waiting lists; 1 in 5 students currently attend a charter school.⁶ There are 6 elementary school options (5 Buffalo Public Schools and 1 charter school) in the proposed zip codes. FRL rates are 90%+ in all schools in the proposed community, with ≈23% students with disabilities, and 1% MLL/ELL. BPS Superintendent Dr. Kriner Cash supports school choice: “As long as charters that are proven to be effective can take all the children and continue to give options to families, that’s a good thing.”⁷ Our Founding Team views this as a call to action and is committed to ensuring families in Schiller Park have a quality K-5 educational option.

e. Planned grades and enrollment: We will enroll 108 students in our inaugural year. Using a slow growth model, we will enroll 81 Kindergarten and 27 first grade students in the first year, adding a cohort of 54 Kindergarten students each year until we are fully enrolled.⁸ We will reach full capacity in 2025-2026 with 324 students in grades K-5.

f. Proposed management and/or partner organization(s): Primary Hall is working with the training and support of Building Excellent Schools (“BES”), a national non-profit that specializes in charter school design, governance, curriculum and instruction, and leadership. Primary Hall will be supported by BES through the planning year and at least the first two years of operation; BES is not a formal partner and has no legal or financial interest in the school.

g. Replication: Through the BES Fellowship, Lead Applicant Arielle Peterson has studied 30+ high performing charter schools across the nation and completed leadership residency at Laureate Academy Charter School in Jefferson Parish, LA, which serves a high need community and has established strong performance results.¹⁰ Overall, Primary Hall’s mission and academic program are informed by practices from high poverty, high-achieving charter schools.

h. School Overview: We are rooted in our mission to ensure that students have the foundational skills needed to thrive in middle school, high school, and college. Emphasizing **academics, access, and impact** for all students, we have designed a K-5 school based upon three priorities to ensure that all K-5 students meet personal and academic success and are firmly on the path to college. **Priority 1: Rigorous curriculum and high-quality instruction drive achievement.** Students must be academically challenged every day. At Primary Hall, we will adopt and develop curricula aligned with New York State Next Generation Learning Standards (“NYSNGLS”) to adequately prepare students for demanding middle and high school programs that will then prepare them for the colleges of their choice. Rigorous curriculum, however, must be paired with high-quality instruction. According to the National Center for Urban School Transformation, “Educators in the high-performing urban schools worked to ensure that all demographic groups of students had quality opportunities to master key concepts. Access to challenging curricula profoundly influences the achievement of excellent and equitable learning results.”¹¹ We dedicate significant time and resources to train and equip teachers to execute strong lessons that lead to student mastery. Our school is designed to develop students with the ability to reason and think critically, articulate themselves in writing, and solve complex problems. We monitor student progress and adjust our approach to maximize learning by aggressively monitoring students’ skills based on grade-specific NYSNGLS. Instruction and student learning will be measurable and assessments will be used as tools to inform instruction. Assessment data speaks to the reality of student progress and is one of our greatest asset as solutions-oriented educators. We begin the year with diagnostic testing as the initial step in being responsive to student need and use the Northwest Evaluation Association Measures of Academic Progress (“NWEA MAP”) in Reading and Math in all grades K-5 to be accountable to our college preparatory mission and in preparation for the New York State Assessment beginning in grade 3. NWEA MAP scores will measure standards-based skills and allow us to consistently and reliably identify areas of growth for our students so that we are preparing them to be competitive with students in local areas like Williamsville, Clarence, and Amherst, as well as throughout our state and nation. We also know that literacy is the basis of all other learning and critical to all K-5 instruction, as literacy allows students to unlock knowledge through access to a variety of resources and standards-based, rigorous lessons. With literacy as a requirement for a life filled with opportunity, “[t]he end of third grade marks the point when children transition from learning to read to using reading to learn other subjects. Children who read proficiently by the end of third grade are more likely to graduate from high school and to be economically successful in adulthood.”¹² We allocate 175 daily instructional minutes to literacy - 50% more time when compared to a range of 90, 120, and 132 minutes¹³ provided in local schools. We leverage small group instruction and essential skills/enrichment groups to target student needs. We build literacy skills through guided reading, extensive phonics instruction, and whole and small group reading comprehension instruction, and students’ progress to the next grade level as proficient readers who love literature. This approach is particularly critical for our MLLs/ELLs, students with

disabilities, and students from economically disadvantaged backgrounds; in Buffalo, students represented in these subgroups are consistently less proficient in ELA than their counterparts and dramatically less proficient than needed to be college bound. **Priority 2: Structure, joy, and individualized supports lead to academic and personal success.** Structure is in service of academics; it allows students to focus and gives teachers the space to teach. All K-5 students will reach academic and personal success through individualized instruction and attention to their individual needs, as research informs us that children learn and develop skills at different rates.¹⁴ To achieve our mission and make significant gains in student learning, Primary Hall will provide a school that is safe, warm, predictable, and demanding. It has been found that in urban schools, “establishing school structure sets the stage not only for academic optimism in a school but [also] for higher student achievement.”¹⁵ When there is structure, there is then room for joy that lends itself to learning. We will plan through every operational and cultural aspect of our school so that students can remain focused on academic growth and develop strong personal and scholarly habits. Attention to detail will be seen in such small things as how and where student materials are stored, as well as how learning materials are displayed and managed on student desks. There will be clear pathways for school traffic and procedures for transitions to ensure that instructional minutes are saved. We will use small group instruction, diagnostic testing, and enrichment/essential skills time to meet students’ individual needs. With individualized instruction, learning strategies will be based on student readiness, interests, and best practices - all to help each student master the skills they need as defined by established academic standards. Individualized supports are not only for students who may have greater areas of growth, but also for students already meeting benchmarks and needing more challenge. With personalized learning, “[i]ndividual students can progress through the curriculum at different speeds, based on their learning needs. This approach serves students who may need to review previously covered material, students who don’t want to waste time covering information they’ve already mastered, or students who need to proceed through the curriculum more slowly or immerse themselves in a certain topic”¹⁶ to master it. **Priority 3: Intentional character development equips students with skills needed for life.** Primary Hall will model, cultivate, and celebrate behaviors that will serve students well over time. We believe that “[i]nstruction . . . based on academic standards, behavioral expectations, and social and emotional competencies valued by the community . . . lead to college and career readiness.”¹⁷ We intentionally teach manners (please, thank you, excuse me) and how to respectfully disagree, and draw upon research that shows “[t]he impact of character education . . . many character education schools are reporting reduced violence, fewer discipline referrals, less vandalism, improved attendance and higher academic performance.”¹⁸ We believe that we must share in the work of helping to reach the next generation of ethical, community-oriented leaders. Our core values are all about **IMPACT** - Integrity, Mastery, Perseverance, Ambition, Confidence, and Teamwork - and we believe that embodying these values will allow students to reach academic and personal success and thus make **IMPACT** in their families, our community, and nation. Character education will be taught

with a lesson each day and will begin with a focus on our **IMPACT** values and the social and emotional development of our students. As complement, and critical to our community, all K-5 students will engage in daily **mindfulness** practices, allowing students to gain skills in maintaining focus and emotional regulation, shown to lessen stress and anxiety which can impede learning.¹⁹

III. Enrollment and Retention Strategies

a. Strategies for Recruitment and Enrollment. Our enrollment policies and processes will be in full compliance with all federal and state requirements, allowing full access to all students regardless of gender, race, ethnicity, home language, ability, or any other protected status. We have chosen the East Side of Buffalo, specifically the Schiller Park neighborhood, to target a student enrollment that has significant need for a quality K-5 school option. We celebrate the diversity that exists in Buffalo and will actively recruit students from various backgrounds. Recruiting a student population that reflects the local district, we anticipate that 85% of students will come from economically disadvantaged backgrounds, 15% will be ELLs, and 23% will be students with disabilities. To recruit students from economically disadvantaged backgrounds, we have created and will continue to nurture partnerships with local Head Start Programs, Community Action Organization of Western New York (CAO Head Start/Holy Cross Head Start), community support initiatives such as the Buffalo Healthy Corner Store Initiative, Historic East Side Neighborhood Initiative, churches and faith-based communities, and organizations that serve our populations in need such as The Resource Council of WNY and The Boys and Girls Clubs of Buffalo, and we will distribute flyers and hold information sessions in the Buffalo Municipal Housing Authority developments. To recruit ELLs, we will create school marketing materials in other primary languages in our community, including Spanish; while canvassing, we will have native speakers with us to aid in translation. We will work with the International Institute of Buffalo for material translations and interpreters and partner with Journey's End Refugee Services to engage families with age-eligible students new to our country. School recruitment materials will include information regarding our inclusion of special education and ELLs and our approach to individualized supports in learning. We will continue to learn from the Parent Network of WNY on how to best support and provide access to students with special needs.

b. Retention Strategies. We are committed to educating all students and we will work to retain all students each year. Our retention strategies first require that we build and maintain meaningful relationships with parents and families, beginning during the enrollment process with Home Visits and continuing with weekly check-ins with families. Each month, teachers will call every family to share students' academic and personal success in school. It is our belief that parents should have access to student progress as well as touch points with staff members that are both positive and productive. Each day, students will receive a behavior log included in their homework folder, highlighting the student's behavior during the school day as well as the daily homework assignments. Each night, parents will be expected to sign the log and the log will have an additional space for families to communicate with classroom teachers. Parents will be invited to four quarterly report card conferences, six annual family nights, as well as have a standing weekly invitation to school for a community celebration of academic success, student

embodiment of our **IMPACT** values, and outstanding daily attendance. Parents will be encouraged (though not required) to support the school and their child through volunteering in Parents' Club. Additionally, we will solicit best practices with other charter schools in the region to make ourselves aware of any additional supports that can be provided to ensure students are accessing curriculum and meeting goals set in their IEPs. Our Head of School and Director of Student Supports (NY licensed special educator) will lead the work of supporting diverse learners. All staff members will receive ongoing professional development in educating all students. We will retain MLLs/ELLs by maintaining a diverse instructional staff and staffing teachers will ENL and TESOL endorsements. We will ensure that school information is translated, at minimum, into three primary languages spoken in by our families, in addition to contracting translators when engaging with the community. We will maintain economically disadvantaged students by maintaining a presence in our proposed community's libraries, recreational/community centers, and Buffalo Municipal Housing Authority, and we will build a community among families through school-based engagement activities and lift their voices as advocates for the school.


IV. Public Outreach and Community Support

- b. **Initial Assessment of Parent Interest/Demand:** Primary Hall began its community outreach in August 2018. Since then, we have met with multiple community organizations and stakeholder groups and received their input for our school design. We have built relationships with community members, families, and leaders and have solicited feedback from 150+ parents and community members through 130+ surveys and 500+ in person conversations in our proposed community. We have heard from families that transportation and after-school programming are important to consider, which we are actively incorporating into our school design and operational plans. We have a social media presence with 163 supporters on Facebook and 75 followers on Instagram and 163 signatures on our petition; we have distributed 500+ flyers across our community, and we look forward to continuing to further build these relationships going forward.


