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Background and Instructions**Background**

Section 9-a of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2021, as amended by §5-a of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2022 requires, on or before July 1, 2022, every local educational agency (LEA) receiving funding from the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funding from the American Rescue Plan (ARP) act of 2021 to post on its website and submit to the New York State Education Department (NYSED) an updated plan of how such funds will be expended and how the LEA will prioritize spending on non-recurring expenses as defined in section 9-a(1) of part A of chapter 56 of the laws of 2021. This updated plan must include:

- An analysis of public comment;
- Goals and ratios for pupil support;
- Detailed summaries of Investments in current year activities; and
- Balance of funds spent in priority areas.

Instructions

The *State Budget Reporting Survey* is due by July 1, 2022.

LEAs must complete all sections and are required to answer questions marked with a red asterisk. If a required question has not been completed, the business portal will highlight it in red and the section of the application will be flagged. The applicant will be unable to submit the application to NYSED for final review if a required question remains unresolved.

The online application may only be submitted/certified by the chief school officer of the applicant LEA. The designated superintendent (public school LEAs) or the chief executive officer, board of trustees president, or school employee designated by the board of trustees (charter school LEAs), are the only administrators with the submit/certify rights necessary to successfully submit and certify a completed application for NYSED review.

LEAs are NOT REQUIRED to send hard copies of survey materials to the Department.

Throughout the pandemic, the Gates Chili Central School District provided a number of outlets for public comment so that feedback could be shared relating to student needs and resource allocation. Initially, public comment was received during regularly scheduled Board of Education meetings. As part of the normal meeting process, community members shared feedback relating to student need during the public comment period. This feedback was specific to pandemic related considerations. Additionally, the feedback was shared during various public budget forums including the Budget Ambassador program. Finally, public comment was solicited through a survey available to all stakeholders (students, faculty/staff, community members, parents/guardians, alumni) and 313 responses were received. Once all this feedback was received, the administrative team compiled the feedback from these meetings and outlets and began analysis. This analysis suggested that the learning community wished for funds to be used to close academic gaps for students not meeting grade level standards, support students' social-emotional well being, and improve overall air quality in school buildings through both HVAC systems and overall educational space design, and intergrate adequate classroom technology to meet the needs of a flexible, collaborative, and creative classroom environment.
