









Keynote Speaker: Brian Favors

Brian Favors is the co-founder of <u>Breaking The Cycle Consulting Services</u> and specializes in preparing educators and parents to utilize culturally responsive teaching methods to increase academic achievement in at-risk student populations. Mr. Favors is also the co-founder and program director of the Nate Parker Foundation, which partners with HBCUs to empower young filmmakers of African descent to use film and storytelling as a vehicle for community healing and transformation. He

taught social studies and special education at Bushwick Community Alternative High School in Brooklyn, NY for over a decade. Mr. Favors currently serves as the Director of Teaching and Learning for Inspiring Minds, NYC which empowers youth through leadership and entrepreneurial programs. He was a contributing author to both Internalized Oppression: The Psychology of Marginalized Groups (Springer Publishing Company, 2014) and The Birth of a Nation and the Making of a Movement (Simon and Shuster, 2016). He was also featured in the National Geographic documentary film, *Rise Up: The Legacy of Nat Turner*. Brian earned a Bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of California, Davis, a M.Ed. from Penn State University, and a M.S.Ed. from Queens College.



Keynote Speaker: Jordan Pierre

A nationally recognized keynote speaker, youth advocate, and media strategist, Jordan Pierre is a force in modern storytelling. With features on The Tamron Hall Show and Hoda & Jenna, he has harnessed the power of his voice to educate, uplift, and mobilize communities. His words don't just spark conversation—they ignite action.

A proud Syracuse University alumnus, Jordan's academic foundation is as formidable as his presence. With a B.A. in Broadcast and Digital Journalism and an M.A. in Television, Radio, and Film, he merges deep media expertise with an unshakable commitment to truth, representation, and impact. His ability to distill complex issues into compelling narratives has made him a sought-after speaker and strategist, shaping conversations that matter.

With the cadence of Martin and the unapologetic urgency of Malcolm, Jordan speaks with a rare blend of grace and conviction. His eloquence is not just in his words but in his ability to shift mindsets, challenge norms, and inspire the next generation to rise. Whether on stage, on screen, or in the community, he is more than a speaker—he is a movement.

In an era where authenticity is currency and leadership is defined by action, Jordan Pierre stands at the intersection of both—a thought leader, a truth-teller, and a voice that will echo for generations to come.





Mainstage Presenter: Cheryl Willis

Cheryl Wills is an Emmy award-winning journalist for **Spectrum News New York 1**. As the first African American woman to host a prime-time nightly newscast for the cable network, Cheryl anchors the Emmy-nominated broadcast *Live at Ten* on weeknights. Cheryl has been with NY1 since its launch in 1992 and is one of the station's most recognizable journalists for breaking news and special coverage. She is also the talk show host of the weekly public affairs program, *In Focus with Cheryl Wills*, where she interviews the most powerful newsmakers and celebrities in the country.

Cheryl is also the acclaimed author of a series of books about her family's transition from slavery to freedom in the United States. *Die Free: A Heroic Family Tale, The Emancipation of Grandpa Sandy Wills, Emancipated: My Family's Fight for Freedom,* and *EMMA* all chronicle her 3x great-grandfather's heroic service as a member of the United States Colored Troops during The Civil War.

On March 25, 2011, Cheryl Wills made history as the first journalist invited to speak at the United Nations General Assembly Hall for The International Remembrance of Victims of Slavery and the Transatlantic Slave Trade, which was broadcast live around the world on UNTV.

Cheryl has been honored numerous times during her 30+ years as a journalist. In 2023, Cheryl was awarded the prestigious Gracie Award from the Alliance for Women in Media. Cheryl has also received awards from The New York Press Club, The Newswomen's Club of New York, and The Associated Press, and she received a special medal from the United Nations Correspondents Association, personally presented to her by U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-Moon. City & State Magazine hailed Cheryl as one of New York's most "remarkable women", and Cheryl is one of the women profiled in the award-winning 2020 book, *She is Me: How Women Will Save the World*.

Cheryl is proud to be the Commander and Lifetime Descendant Member of the New York Chapter of the Sons and Daughters of the United States Colored Troops – a national organization of Civil War descendants who raise awareness about 200,000 black soldiers who bravely served during The Civil War. She graduated from the prestigious S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications at Syracuse University.

Mainstage Presenter: Baruti Kafele



A prolific writer, Principal Kafele has written extensively on professional development strategies for creating a positive school climate and culture, transforming the attitudes of at-risk students, motivating Black males to excel in the classroom, and school leadership practices for inspiring schoolwide excellence. In addition to writing several professional articles for popular education journals, he has authored fourteen books. His newest book, *What is My Value INSTRUCTIONALLY to the Teachers I Supervise?* was released in December 2024. Principal Kafele is also the creator and host of the popular AP & New Principals Academy, which is streamed live every Saturday morning on his AP & New Principals Academy YouTube channel at 10:55 ET.

Principal Kafele earned his B.S. degree in Management Science/Marketing from Kean University and his M.A. degree in Educational Administration from New Jersey City University. He is the recipient of over 150 educational, professional, and community awards, which include the prestigious Milken Educator Award, recognition as one of the world's top 30 education professionals by Global Gurus Top 30 for six consecutive years (2020 - 2025), recognition for creating one of the world's top school leadership training programs by Global Training (2025), and the City of Dickinson, Texas proclaiming February 8, 1998 as Baruti Kafele Day.

He is currently the Assistant Commissioner for the Office of Access, Equity, and Community Engagement in the New York State Education Department. In this capacity, he informs educational policy across the state and administers

nearly \$200 million to help support students from Pre-K through graduate school. This includes oversight of the historic New York State My Brother's Keeper movement to improve outcomes for boys and young men of color created by President Obama.

Before serving as Assistant Commissioner, he was the Superintendent of Schools for the Hamilton Central School District. As a superintendent, Dr. A distinguished himself as one of the few Superintendents across the nation to have a 100% graduation rate. Additionally, Dr. A is a former New York State Middle School Principal of the Year, where he led a once struggling school to win the prestigious National Association of Secondary School Principals Breakthrough School award for dramatic school turnaround.





Workshop Presenter: Anibal Soler, Jr.

Anibel Soler, Jr. serves as Superintendent of Yonkers Public Schools as of May 1, 2024, bringing 25 years of experience in urban education and district leadership. He has led transformative initiatives, including community schools and the My Brother's Keeper program, across Buffalo, Batavia, Schenectady, and now Yonkers. Known for championing access, opportunity, and student well-being, Mr. Soler blends visionary leadership

with strategic execution. His commitment to academic excellence and community partnerships continues to create inclusive, empowering environments where students and families thrive.



Workshop Presenter: Dr. Jason Baez

Dr. Jason Baez serves as Executive Director of MBK Yonkers, a role he began in May 2024. He joined Yonkers Public Schools in 2022 as Assistant Principal at Charles E. Gorton High School, where he led the school's MBK chapter and launched its MBK Leadership Program.

Previously, Dr. Baez was an Assistant Principal in the South Bronx, where he spearheaded MBK initiatives in NYC Public Schools. As a teacher in Queens, he mentored early-career male educators of color through NYC Men Teach, helping retain diverse talent in classrooms.

Dr. Baez continues shaping future educators as an adjunct professor in the education departments at City College of New York (CUNY) and Monroe College.

Ms. Thompson-Taylor is the Associate Dean of College Counseling at Choate Rosemary Hall. She holds a Bachelor of Arts in Linguistics from the University of the West Indies and a Master of Science in Strategic Leadership from Roberts Wesleyan College. She began her career in higher education at the University of Rochester, spending over eight years in the undergraduate admissions office and a year and a half as the inaugural Director of the

Intercultural Center. Ms. Thompson-Taylor then made the move to the other side of the desk, working as Associate Director of College Counseling at Phillips Exeter Academy in New Hampshire before joining the team at Choate.

As a mentor, he helped young men of color grow in confidence, purpose, and leadership. His impactful work earned him the honor of attending the Obama Foundation's national convening in Oakland, CA as part of the New York State MBK delegation. This experience an experience that further solidified his lifelong commitment to mentorship and community empowerment.

Jeremiah is the author of *Lead Like a Champion*, and he continues to inspire audiences around the world through his message of resilience, growth, and leadership. His contributions have been widely recognized; he was named the 2023 and 2024 Mental Health Leader of the Year by NAMI New York State.



Workshop Presenter: Jalin Thomas

Jalin Thomas is proof that leadership, resilience, and vision can shape a life of purpose. A proud graduate of Michigan State University, Jalin developed his leadership skills as a student manager under Hall of Fame basketball coach Tom Izzo, playing a key role in supporting one of the nation's most competitive college basketball programs.

During his time with the Spartans, Jalin gained firsthand experience in the discipline, teamwork, and perseverance required to build champions—serving as part of an NCAA Final Four team and contributing to an Elite Eight run. These lessons became the foundation of his work as an author, entrepreneur, and mentor.

He co-authored The Clueless Compass, a practical and inspiring guide designed to help young adults navigate college and early adulthood with confidence. The book offers personal stories and actionable strategies to help readers turn uncertainty into opportunity.

Jalin is also the founder of Clueless: The Movement, a lifestyle brand and clothing line rooted in a powerful message—helping young people embrace uncertainty, ask better questions, and build self-belief. Clueless is more than apparel; it's a mindset that encourages youth to trust the process and take ownership of their journey. With a passion for mentorship, storytelling, and entrepreneurship, Jalin equips the next generation to dream big, take bold action, and define success on their own terms.





Workshop Presenter: Dr. Yolanda Sealey-Ruiz

Yolanda Sealey-Ruiz, Ph.D. is a Professor of English Education at Teachers College, Columbia University. Her research has appeared in several top-tier academic journals. She is co-editor of four books and a co-author of the multiple award-winning book, *Advancing Racial Literacies in Teacher Education: Activism for Equity in Digital Spaces* (2021), where she examines her concept of Archeology of Self TM in education. For three years in a row, she was named one of EdWeek's EduScholar Influencers — a list of the Top 1% of educational scholars in the

United States — a highly selective group of 200 scholars (chosen from a pool of 20,000).

At Teachers College, she founded the Racial Literacy Project @TC and the Racial Literacy Roundtables Series, where, for 14 years, national scholars, teachers, and students facilitated conversations around race and other issues involving diversity. Yolanda appeared in Spike Lee's 2Fists Up: We Gon' Be Alright (2016), a documentary about the Black Lives Matter movement and the campus protests at Mizzou, and Defining Us, Children at the Crossroads of Change, a documentary about supporting and educating the nation's Black and Latinx male youth. She also appeared in Black Girls (2024), a documentary about Black girls and women in society. Yolanda's first full-length collection of poetry, Love from the Vortex & Other Poems, was published in March 2020. Her sophomore book of poetry, The Peace Chronicles, was published in July 2021. Yolanda opened the 2022 TEDx UPENN conference at the University of Pennsylvania with her TEDx Talk: Truth, Love & Racial Literacy. Dr. Autumn A. Griffin is a Postdoctoral Research Fellow in Georgia State's College of Education & Human Development and a fellow for NCTE's Cultivating New Voices Fellowship for Scholars of Color. Broadly, with implications across the fields of English Education, Digital Black Studies, and Gender Studies, Dr. Griffin's work explores how Black adolescents engage literature and literacy to read stories and (re)write

counter stories about their experiences with gendered and racialized oppression as well as Black joy and love. Dr. Griffin published her work in the *Research in the Teaching of English, Urban Education, Equity and Excellence in Education* and she recently released her first book, *Restorying Young Adult Literature: Expanding Students' Perspectives with Digital Texts*, co-authored with colleagues Joshua Coleman and Ebony Elizabeth Thomas. Dr. Griffin also formerly co-founded the digital network Blackademia, a platform built to explore historical and contemporary experiences of Black women in the academy and to support Black doctoral students on their journeys by offering community through its podcast, blog, and virtual book chats. In her spare time, Dr. Griffin teaches and practices yoga, loves to garden, and can be found anywhere there is live music.
