High-Tech Security Features

As we planned for the Phase 2 Smart Schools Project, the following needs and opportunities were identified:

- Some areas throughout the exterior of the school campus are not viewable via our existing security cameras. There is a need to improve exterior coverage.
- Our current building lockdown system, while effective, can be enhanced. Smart Schools presents an opportunity to improve the existing system by streamlining audio alerts of a lockdown as well as adding visual cues to alert staff, students, and the community that the school is in a lockdown situation.

The phase 2 project focuses on one category: High Tech Security

- Increase exterior security camera coverage throughout the Hannibal CSD campus, including all instructional buildings and outdoor instructional spaces
- Install cabling to accommodate the installation of exterior cameras in all proposed locations
- Install blue lockdown strobe lights at exterior entrances and in large interior gathering areas, and integrate them into our current lockdown control system
- Integrate lockdown system with current IP paging systems
