Morrisville-Eaton CSD has successfully supported a 1:1 student device deployment as well as devices for the staff in the district. Utilizing our 1Gbps internet bandwidth and 10Gbps inter-networking connectivity, we have successfully completed student based testing and a multitude of other network stressing activities.

We have a robust wireless infrastructure in both of our buildings. Currently we have 41 managed access points in our Middle High School and 34 at our Elementary building. This infrastructure has well supported our student and staff population utilizing their upward of 800 wireless connected mobile devices. We continue to improve upon the infrastructure as we have plans for adding an additional 20 access points next year to supply an even more robust network.

Morrisville-Eaton CSD intends to purchase an additional 140 student laptops to replace aging devices currently in use. These replacement laptops utilize the same power charging and storage systems as the device they are replacing and will function as a "dropin" replacement requiring no additional HVAC or infrastructure.

Researchers have found that "blending technology with teacher involvement to support interactive learning, exploration, and creation (instead of "drill and kill" techniques) leads to higher engagement and learning gains" (Darling-Hammond, Zielezinski, & Goldman, 2014 as cited in Edutopia's Review of Research, 2015). Edutopia's Review of Research also notes that technology cannot solely be added to school settings. To improve learning and achievement, professional development, integrated learning experiences, and student engagement are key. Morrisville-Eaton's plan incorporates all these factors. Expanding effective integrated instructional technology consistently across the grade levels will strengthen and enhance our students' 21st century skills and achievement of NextGen Standards. The district has also had great success utilizing these student devices as communication tools for ELL students utilizing translators and speech to text.

Keeping student device hardware up to date allows us to continually explore new technology pathways and sets the district up for success in these ventures. Avoiding stumbles such as insufficient device resources and/or device failure due to hardware used beyond its useful life. The district is able to switch to virtual learning very fluidly due to the fact that student devices are in fact current and having this ability in the future will prepare us for any unanticipated events requiring distance learning. Furthermore, teachers can communicate with their students and vice versa at moments when traditional school may not be taking place or in the event of sickness or other unexpected circumstances. Keeping this channel of communication open is most helpful to the ongoing education and relationships needed for success.
