The district has a guaranteed 800 Mbps synchronous internet connection shared amongst all three school buildings. This connectivity is provided via an annual contract with our local BOCES. All of our students are collectively served by this single connection. Our wireless network uses primarily WiFi 6E-capable access points containing 3 independent radios in all interior locations, with an AP in each standard-sized instructional room and larger spaces such as cafeterias having 2 or more APs based on the room's seating capacity. Each AP is capable of handling at least 100-200 associated clients, which is well above the expected client count in any of those locations. All APs are uplinked to a network switch with a gigabit fiber trunk back to the MDF.

maintaining IPS capability in use to support their instructional needs. To optimize Internet bandwidth utilization across the district, we also have a server in each school dedicated to caching system updates and many application installers & updates, which in total saves between 100-150TB of Internet traffic per month by serving those downloads from the local network. During a normal school day, monitoring shows our peak Internet utilization rarely exceeding 600Mbps. The aforementioned gigabit connection is more than sufficient for all instructional activity.

The purchase of 70 new iPads will allow the district to provide additional class sets of devices for kindergarten, first, second and special education classes at Mill Road Elementary School. The building already has some shared sets of iPads and a stationary lab of iPads. All of these current devices (and the additional devices required in this application) are compatible with existing platforms and systems.

There is adequate electrical, HVAC and other infrastructure in place to support the operation of the planned technology.

The strategic implementation of these 70 iPads will directly address identified learning gaps within our district by providing targeted interventions and accelerated learning opportunities through data-driven instruction. The devices enable teachers to quickly identify students who are falling behind through real-time assessment tools and progress monitoring applications, allowing for immediate intervention before gaps become insurmountable. Struggling readers can access books at their appropriate reading level while being supported by text-to-speech features and interactive vocabulary tools that build comprehension skills. Students with math difficulties can utilize manipulative apps and visual problem-solving tools that break down complex concepts into manageable steps, providing the scaffolded support necessary for mastery. The iPads' ability to provide immediate feedback and multiple practice opportunities ensures that students receive the repetition and reinforcement needed to solidify learning, while advanced students can access enrichment materials that prevent them from losing engagement and motivation in their educational journey.
