 Describe how you intend to use Smart Schools Bond Act funds to install high-tech security features in school buildings and on school campuses.

In the first meetings of the Smart School planning committee, the priority of providing all students with a safe learning environment was the top priority.

Door security was the number one priority for the Smart School funding. Currently, Valley Central has primarily traditional exterior door locks tha depend on keys. Keys that can be misplaced or "borrowed." Doors that can be opened from the inside and blocked open for a later return. One of the recent school tragedies occured when a door was propped open while a teacher went to her car. An unauthorized individual used that open doors as an opportunity to access the buildings and classrooms.

Valley Central is proposing to install a Door Swipe systm of access identification cards and card swipes that unlock the doors. An individual who wants to enter the building swipes their card at the outside of the door and if they are authorized, the door unlocks and they enter. The cards have a magnetic stripe on them that provides a unique identification for each staff member. Some staff members only need access when school is in session. Others may need it after hours. Coaches might require access on the weekends or in the evenings.

In the event that an identification card turns up missing, the user can notify the security office and that card can be immediately deativated. This would make it worthless. With the traditional key system currently in use, a misplaced key still works.

Attached to this system are strobe lights and panic buttons. In the event of an emergency, staff members can hit a button and ALL of the doors on the building close and lock. If hall doors or even classroom doors are added to this system, everyone can go to shelter in place and all the attached doors close and lock. Additionally, strobe lights will begin flashing. Anyone approaching the building will be notified that there is an incident and they should not approach the building.
