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- Culminating Projects
 - o Criteria for the Culminating Project

 - Note: If students are doing culminating projects for both English and a World Language for a total of 4 points, they must be different projects (translations of a project into another language do not qualify for the NYSSB).
 - Recommendation to balance student and Seal of Biliteracy committee (SBC) workload: consider starting and/or completing the Home Language (L1) Culminating Project in junior year and the second language (L2) Culminating Project in senior year.
 - L1 refers to a language a student learned at home; this is often the one in which the student is most proficient. For students whose home language is English, the L1 is English, therefore, the recommendation above refers to English speakers completing the English requirements for the NYSSB in the junior year. For English Language Learners (ELLs), current or former, the L1 is a language other than English, therefore, the recommendation above refers to ELLs (current and former) completing the World Language requirements for the NYSSB in the junior year.
 - L2 refers to a language a student learned after the home language, generally in a school setting. For students whose home language is English, the L2 is generally a World Language studied in school, therefore, the recommendation above refers to English speakers completing the World Language requirements for the NYSSB in the senior year. For English Language Learners (ELLs), current or former, the L2 is generally English, therefore, the recommendation above refers to ELLs (current and former) completing the English requirements for the NYSSB in the senior year.
- Panel presentations and evaluation the Culminating Project
 - Performance expectation: ACTFL Intermediate High Level in the three modes of communication
 - Interpretive (listening, reading)

- Presentational (speaking, writing)
- o 3 corners activity
