

Title IV, Part A: Student Support and Academic Enrichment (SSAE) Fact Sheet

Title IV, Part A of the Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015 (Title IV-A) is intended to improve students' academic achievement by increasing the capacity of States, local educational agencies (LEAs), schools, and local communities to provide all students with access to a well-rounded education, improve school conditions for student learning, and improve the use of technology in order to improve the academic achievement and digital literacy of all students.

Allocation, Application, and Program:

- Title IV-A funds are allocated to all LEAs that received a Title I, Part A allocation in the preceding fiscal year.
- By statute, each eligible LEA receives a Title IV- A allocation of at least \$10,000.
- LEAs must consult and collaborate with <u>required stakeholders</u> to receive Title IV-A funds, to plan the Title IV-A
 program activities described in the Consolidated ESSA Application and must engage in on-going consultation about
 the funded activities in the Consolidated Application regarding program objectives and intended outcomes.
- LEAs with an allocation of <u>\$30,000 or more</u> are required to conduct a *comprehensive needs assessment* once every three years to examine the needs for improvement of well-rounded educational opportunities (WRE), school conditions for student learning (SHS), and access to personalized learning experiences supported by technology (EUT).
- Title IV-A funds are subject to <u>equitable services</u> requirements for non-public schools located within an LEA's geographic catchment area.
 - Each LEA should calculate a per pupil amount based on total student enrollment at the private school, regardless of the students' district of residency.
- <u>Transferability</u>: LEAs may transfer a portion or all of its Title IV-A allocation to Title I-A, Title I-D, Title I-D, Title II-A, Title III-A, or Title V-B. (Prior to transferring funds, LEA must have assessed Title IV-A needs, consulted with required stakeholders, and consulted with in-district private schools to determine that transferring is the most appropriate use of funds to meet identified needs.)
- All programs and activities funded under Title IV-A for LEAs and eligible non-public schools must be based on <u>identified needs</u> described in the Consolidated ESSA application and shall be <u>programmatically aligned</u> with one or more of the three Title IV content area programs- Well-Rounded Education (WRE). TITLE IV, PART A: STUDENT SUPPORT AND ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

Guidance on Allowable and Unallowable Expenditures

Below is a general overview of allowable and unallowable activities to support Title IV, Part A (Title IV-A) program planning activities.

LEAs should take the following steps to determine if a proposed program or activity is allowable under Title IV-A:

- 1. Verify that proposed Title IV-A activities were informed by needs, stakeholder engagement, and prioritization of schools.
- 2. LEAs must ensure that the identified needs are listed in the Title IV-A section of the Consolidated Application and the proposed program or activity addresses the identified needs.
 - For nonpublic schools, confirm that LEA Affirmation of Private School Consultation has identified the need for the proposed Title IV-A activities.
- 3. Confirm that the proposed activity is consistent with the purposes of at least one of the three content areas in the Title IV-A program: Well-Rounded Education (WRE); Safe and Healthy Students (SHS); or the Effective Use of Technology (EUT).
- 4. Determine if the proposed expenditure is reasonable, necessary, and allocable to the grant.
 - Reasonable: consistent with prudent business practice and comparable current market value.
 - Necessary: required to carry out the intent and purpose of the Title IV-A program.
 - Allocable: chargeable or assignable in accordance with relative benefits received. In addition, costs must be aligned with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) and adequately documented and budgeted within the grant.
- 5. Verify that the proposed use of funds for the activities <u>supplement, and not supplant</u>, other state or local funds that would otherwise be used to pay for the allowable activity. **Supplanting is presumed** if any of the following is true, according to federal fiscal guidance (2 CFR Part 200, Appendix XI):
 - A district uses federal funds to provide services that are required under other federal, state, or local laws.
 - A district uses federal funds to provide services that the district provided with non-federal funds in the prior year.
 - A district uses federal funds to provide services that the district would otherwise provide without federal funds.

Note: These presumptions may be overcome if the district can demonstrate that it would not have provided the services absent the availability of these federal funds. For example, new STEAM professional development had been provided with state grant funds for middle school teachers, and the grant funds were not available for the coming year. Title IV-A funds could be used for this PD, assuming no other presumption was violated, and the district would not otherwise have been able to provide the PD.

6. Ensure that the activity is not one of the prohibited activities in ESEA Section 4001(b) or Section 8526, as amended by the ESSA.

Allowable Expenditures

Activities to Support a Well-Rounded Education (WRE)

- STEM: Science, technology, engineering, and mathematics, including computer science
 - Increasing access for groups of underrepresented students to high-quality courses
 - Supporting participation of low-income students in nonprofit competitions related to STEM
 - Providing students hands-on learning and exposure to STEM, including through field-based and service learning
 - Supporting the creation and enhancement of STEM-focused specialty schools
 - Facilitating collaboration among school, afterschool program, and informal program personnel to improve the integration of programming and instruction in the identified subjects
 - Integrating other academic subjects such as the arts into STEM curricula

Music and arts

- Programs and activities that use music and the arts as tools to support student success through the
 promotion of constructive student engagement, problem solving, and conflict resolution
- World language instruction (Foreign language instruction)
- Accelerated learning programs
 - Reimbursing low-income students to cover all or part of the costs of accelerated learning exam fees, if the low-income students are enrolled in accelerated learning courses and plan to take accelerated learning examinations; or
 - Increasing the availability of, and enrollment in, accelerated learning courses, accelerated learning examinations, dual or concurrent enrollment programs, and early college high school courses
- Civics instruction
 - Activities to promote the development, implementation, and strengthening of programs to teach traditional American history, civics, economics, geography, or government education

 - Training counselors to effectively use labor market information in assisting students with postsecondary education and career planning
 - Financial literacy and Federal financial aid awareness activities
- Social and Emotional Learning (SEL)
 - Activities and interventions in SEL that build resilience, self-control, empathy, persistence, and other social and behavioral skills
 - Programs and activities that promote volunteerism and community involvement
- Environmental Education
 - Activities and educational opportunities related to environmental issues

Many of Example <u>CSD's</u> families face disheartening challenges in providing support to their children, such as unemployment, generational poverty, low educational attainment, and instability resulting from drug and alcohol abuse. In a 2021-22 district-wide needs assessment, the impact of these circumstances revealed that students struggle to acquire social emotional competencies, including self-management, responsible decision making, and relationship skills, which pose major obstacles to their success in and out of school. To address this gap, Example <u>CSD</u> will utilize Title IV, Part A funding to implement a multi-level program that will address students' immediate needs for support in times of crisis, provide them with ongoing opportunities to develop critical social-emotional skills, and provide staff professional development to use technology to individualize learning and improve academic success. These strategies will enable students to solve problems, forge strong and healthy interpersonal relationships, make responsible decisions, increase their self-management and self-awareness, and improve their academic achievement.

Well-Rounded Education: The needs assessment indicated that staff and teachers struggle to identify how to best evaluate and support students' social-emotional learning. The district determined that <u>WRE</u> is best utilized to provide a districtwide classroom implementation of social-emotional programming that includes an emphasis on mindfulness and growth mindset.

Safe and Healthy Students: The needs assessment indicated that a large portion of Example <u>CSD's</u> students need more support to navigate life trauma and to reduce bullying and harassment in and out of school. The <u>SHS</u> funding will be focused on building capacity within the district's school-based health and mental health services by adding a Trauma Informed Care Counselor, and preventing bullying and harassment by utilizing Community Resource Officers to educate and support anti-bullying and anti-harassment programs.

Effective Use of Technology: The needs assessment indicated that staff and teachers need more support on how to best personalize learning to improve academic success. Integrating technology into the classroom will enable teachers to readily determine academic shortfalls of their students and enable strategies to personalize learning to improve academic achievement. EUT funding will focus on professional development of teachers to receive training for integrating technology into the classroom.
